#### CHANGES :

1. Fatima College has introduced Choice Based Credit System for all U.G. courses from the academic year 2001-2002.

2. Language Study (Tamil / Hindi / French) is introduced for B.Com. (Regular)

3. Part II - General English is introduced for B.B.A. learning the need for communicative skills.

4.a) From this academic year I B.Com. (Regular) students are also streamlined for Part II English and will do regular Part II English course offered to the rest of the degree students.

b) Department of English has offered graded material of three levels to meet the needs of the students. For the I and II level, the members of the department have released a text book bearing the title 'Getting Ahead'. For both Internal (CIA) and End Semester Examinations, three different levels of question papers are used for evaluation.

The students are streamlined on the basis of their performance in an attainment test on entry and are offered the following three courses.

'A' Stream - Communication Skills - Basic.

'B' Stream - " " - Intermediate.

'C' Stream - " " - Advanced.

5. Project work is introduced in all majors for V or VI Semester either as compulsory subject or as an optional.

6. Comprehensive Viva will be introduced in a few majors.

7. AICTE has given approval for 60 seats for MCA from 2001.

8. B.A. Economics is now termed as B.B.E. and M.A. Economics is renamed as M.B.E.

9. Examination Reforms:

i) 'The Objective-type questions' is being added as one of the Components of End Semester examination question pattern and

this forms  $\frac{1}{4}$  th of the total marks. However General English and language papers do not fall under this category.

ii) Objective-type questions must be answered in the first half-an-hour, in the question paper itself and the same will be collected by the Invigilator at the stipulated time to maintain integrity and avoid malpractice.

iii) It is suggested that the End Semester Question paper must be set by the external examiner for Major & Ancillary papers for all the 3 years of study and the same holds good for End Semester Practicals too.

iv) From this academic year I Degree Course students will appear for Semester Exam for Part I (Language) & Part II (Gen. Eng.), instead of year end exam.

#### Exceptions:

I DC B.Com. - Language - End Sem. exam only at the end of the year.

Comp. Science - Language & Gen. Eng. - End Sem. exam only at the end of the year.

10. External maximum for all papers  $\rightarrow$  100.

11. Fatima College has become an associate of Anna University to provide advanced professional training in Computer Education for the students and the examination will be conducted by Anna University.

Academic Council - Report. 28.09.2001.

The Academic Council meeting started at 10 A.M. with prayer by Sr. Lilly Kuttly (V.P.). Principal, Sr. Ignatius Mary welcomed the gathering. (This is the first Academic Council meeting after her becoming the Principal.) Following the welcome by the new Principal, Mrs. K. Mary Jacintha, Dean of Academic Affairs presented the changes made in various academic matters, which led to the following discussion.

1. SDCE made clarifications regarding the change of nomenclature of B.A. & M.A. Economics into B.B.E. and M.B.E. He asked whether all formalities have been complied with in the change.

The Principal replied that the change has been approved by Madurai Kamaraj University and the written communication in this regard has already been received by the College.

The University nominee suggested that when such changes are made the interest of the students must be protected. She felt that the P.G. students may face problems while appearing for SLET and joining the M.Phil. degree course because of the change in the nomenclature.

2. SDCE made another clarification regarding the objective questions in the End Semester. He asked whether the  $\frac{1}{2}$  an hour time allotted is the first  $\frac{1}{2}$  an hour of the exam or the 1st  $\frac{1}{2}$  an hour of the students' entrance into the exam hall.

The Principal replied that definitely it is the first  $\frac{1}{2}$  an hour of the latter. However, she added that this problem will not arise in Fatima College, as all the students come on time for the exam.

3. There was a lot of discussion on CBCS. JDCE and University nominee unanimously felt that CBCS is a welcome change. Yet they felt the need to clarify various points in this regard. They insisted that the students should be given the real choice in the selection of papers to earn extra credits.

University nominee questioned whether the student who earns extra credits in the I year will be allowed to avoid any elective in the II year.

At this juncture Dr. (Mrs.) B. Shyamala and Dr. (Mrs.) Chellam Ramakrishnan gave a brief explanation on CBCS in Fatima College. They said that this is the I year of introduction of CBCS and students are to be oriented in this regard a lot. As such at present there is no provision to earn extra credits in the I year. But however they can earn extra credits when they come to the III year.

Mrs. Amalorpavarany, department of Mathematics, Fatima College expressed her view stating that if self-study is awarded extra credit, the mode of evaluation is to be fixed. She also said that the individual department should be given autonomy in fixing the credits and project is not feasible at UG level.

Dr. (Miss) Mahima asked the invitees whether certificate courses can be counted as extra credits. The University nominee did not seem to have faith in self-study and dismissed the idea of getting extra credits from outside. She said that the number of credits must be on par with the number of hours allotted for each paper. For example, if a student attending Sociology class for 2 hrs. is to be given 2 credits, the same student may do 6 hrs. of Mathematics and be given 6 credits.

Dr. (Mrs.) M.A. Seema explained the way of approach

of Fatima College (which bears resemblance to that of Loyola college and Holy Cross, Trichy) with regard to CBCS. There are miles to go in this regard and in future the syllabi will expand based on the options offered, keeping in mind the welfare of the student community.

4. H.O.Ds presented a brief note of the minutes of Board of Studies meeting held in May/June 2001 and the syllabi.

IDCE raised questions regarding the following syllabi and the same were clarified by the concerned H.O.Ds.

(i) General English

(ii) Commerce - Banking Law & Accounts.

At the end of the meeting Mr. A.T. Auxilia Felicitas Dean of Academic Affairs proposed the Vote of Thanks.

## MINUTES OF THE ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council Meeting began with a prayer by Dr. Sr. Bindu Antony, Vice-Principal, Shift - I, in SJ5 on May 25, 2022 at 2.30 p.m. The Chairperson of the Academic Council and the Principal, Dr. Sr. G. Celine Sahaya Mary welcomed the gathering, introduced the new members of the Academic Council and highlighted on the significant academic ventures of the college.

Dr. Sr. G. Celine Sahaya Mary invited Dr. S. J. Kala, Dean of Academic Affairs (Arts) to present the resolutions of the Curriculum Development Cell meetings to be approved in the Council. She presented its minutes and resolutions as follows:

The meeting of the Curriculum Development Cell (CDC) was held in Jubilee Hall at 10.30 a.m on February 15, 2022.

Dr. Sr. G. Celine Sahaya Mary, the chairperson of the Curriculum Development Cell initiated discussions on the revamping of the syllabus as proposed by the Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education (TANSCHE) in line with their communication - letter no. - RC. No. 2250/2021 A, dtd. : 29.01.2022. She also underscored the Note in the Preamble of the State Integrated Board of Studies as, it is stated that it is not a compulsion on the part of any educational institution in the State to follow State Integrated Board of Studies. However, if the subjects are to be equivalent, Section 'A' must be covered in the 75% of the syllabus of the subjects concerned.

Besides, Dr. Sr. G. Celine Sahaya Mary, the Principal ensured if the syllabus of each UG & PG programme complied with the Sec. - A - Mandatory Core Areas prescribed by the State Integrated Board of Studies.

After enough discussions on the revamping of the Syllabus and its compliance with the TANSCHE model, the Curriculum Development Cell stressed that the curriculum at Fatima College had gone into zero-based revamping in 2019-2020 while adopting Outcome-Based Education (OBE). Hence, it

was resolved that the syllabus of the different UG & PG programmes for the Academic Year 2021-2022 along with the respective minutes of the Board of Studies (April 2021) and the Academic Council (May 2021) in which they were passed and approved respectively would be sent to TANSCHE and the same were sent.

Following it, the chairpersons of the different Boards of Studies presented the Action Taken Report and the minutes of the Board of Studies held from March 14 to 23, 2022 and May 13, 2022 in the order followed on campus.

At the end of all the presentations by the chairpersons of the different Boards of Studies, the University Nominees and the External Experts placed on record the following commendation and recommendations:

### Commendations and Recommendations :

- Dr. M. Jayalakshmi, (University Nominee), Assistant Professor, Dept. of Immunology, School of Biological Sciences, Madurai Kamaraj University, stated that she deemed it an honour to serve as a member of the Academic Council of this prestigious College. She appreciated each of the Board of Studies for bringing in changes in a minimum of 5 to a maximum of 11 courses with 5 to 10% (min.) of revision in each of the course in the interest and welfare of the students. She also reiterated the fact that Fatima College, an Autonomous institution affiliated to Madurai Kamaraj University was doing its best in the field of Higher Education.
- The systematic and meticulous organisation of the Academic Council Meeting and the highest grade secured in N.A.A.C Assessment Cycle-IV were applauded by the University Nominee, Dr. Kumaresan, Professor & Head, Department of Genetics, School of Biological Sciences, Madurai Kamaraj University.
- Mr. Raja Rajeswaran, Auditor, External Member, appreciated all the efforts taken in making the college known.




## **The Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph was founded in Le Puy, France, in 1650 by Fr. Jean Pierre Medaille.**



**Father Jean-Pierre Medaille** was born in Carcassonne on October 06, 1610. He met a group of widows and women who were eager to be consecrated to God. He directed them and they lived a humble life in small communities.



**Mother Saint Jeanne Fontbonne** was born on March 31, 1759, in Bas-en- Basset (haute-Loire), in a devout Christian rural family. In 1808, Rev. Mother was called to form a group of sisters in St. Etienne. While Rev. Mother was Superior General, the Congregation of Lyons spread over 13 districts of France, into Italy and across the sea.



**Rev. Sr. Rose Benedict** was born on August 24, 1898 in Leema, Canada. She became a member of the Congregation of Sisters of St. Joseph of Lyons in 1913 and in 1924 came to India as a missionary. She laid the foundation for Fatima College in 1953. She entered God's Glory on December 27, 1968 of lung cancer which she contracted inhaling cement as she supervised the construction of Fatima College. Remembering her yeoman service the people of Madurai conferred on her the title of '**Man of Madurai**' and erected her statue in the old campus of Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai.

## ACADEMIC INFORMATION

Fatima College introduced Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in 2001. Since then, the college has raised the bar of Higher Education and has catered to the needs of the stakeholders offering a learner-centric curriculum in the digital era. The College moved from content - based to competency-based Curriculum - Outcome Based Education under CBCS in 2019. This learner-centric teaching pedagogy measures the students' performance through the respective course/ programme outcomes after a considerable period of time. The course/programme outcomes are realised based on the knowledge, skills and attitudes acquired by the learner shaping them into inquisitive researchers, topical innovators, befitting employees of the upcoming job markets and above all better citizens of this global village.
