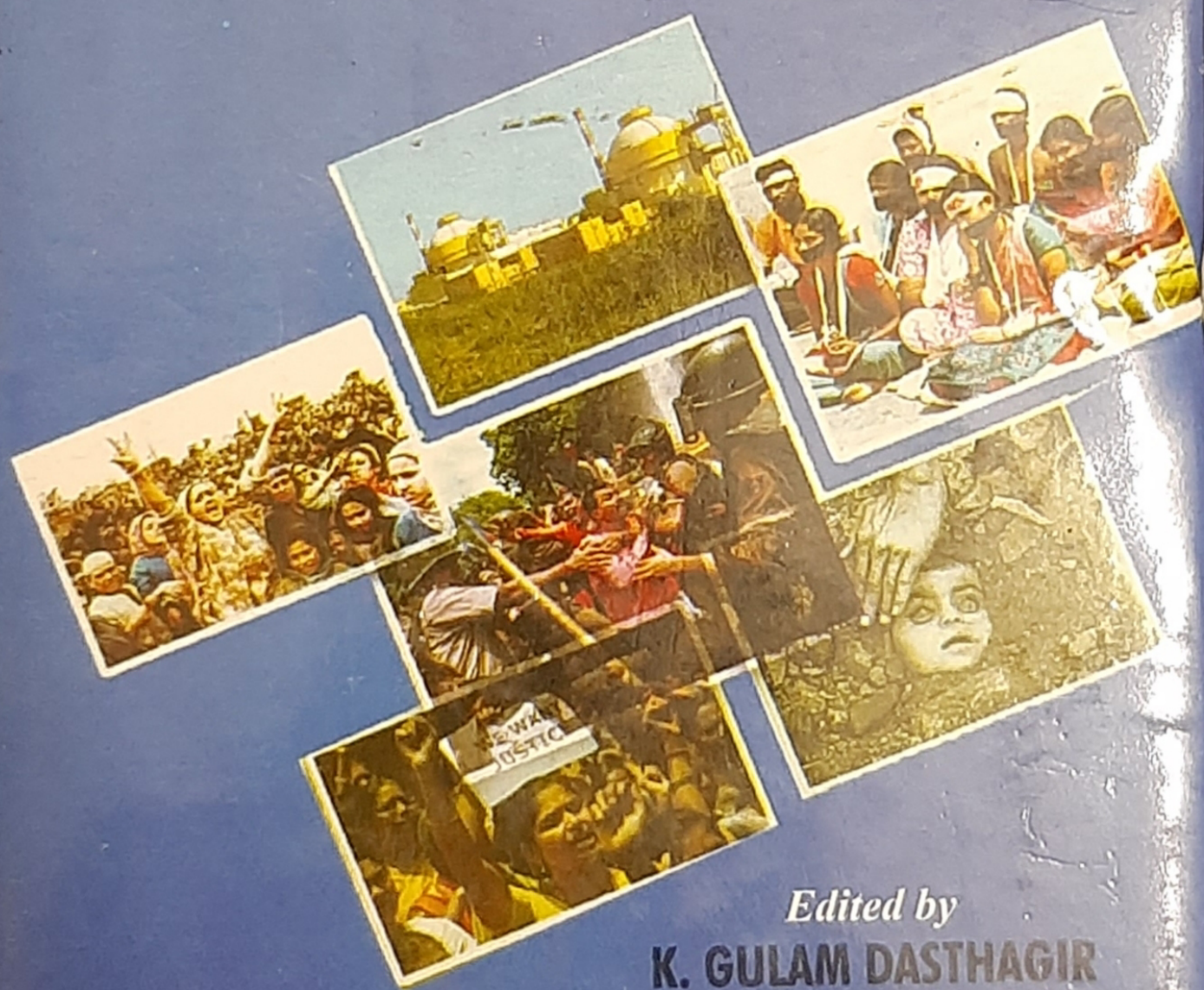

## **Introduction**
