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

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TEACHING ENGLISH TO THE GOVERNMENT SCHOOL STUDENTS OF KONDAYAMPATTI

(2016-17)

Teaching English to the students of Kondayampatti Higher Secondary School is not a new endeavour. It is a continuation of the previous year's teaching activities. This year the target group comprised nearly **200 students of VI, VII & VIII standards**. The classes resumed on August 30, 2016. Unlike last year, customized lessons with language and grammar exercises were specially prepared by the staff and students for this activity. The students handled **classes from 3 – 4.00 p.m. on all Thursdays**. They taught them language elements like vocabulary and grammar and also enhanced their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills. The excitement and enthusiasm of the school students in learning new words and structures boosted the interest of the student teachers and also made them feel proud that they were contributing something to the downtrodden sections of the society.

In collaboration with the college library, books from the library were given to the students to instil reading habits in them. They were made to sit in group and were trained in silent reading and loud reading. The student teachers closely monitored their reading and helped them improve their pronunciation and reading skills.

New words and their spellings, rhyming words, verbs and tenses were taught through short stories included in their lessons. Students were made to read the stories and answer the questions. This helped them improve their comprehension.

Language games like word games and crossword puzzles were introduced and the students participated in them with great interest and enthusiasm. Tongue twisters, nursery rhymes and conversations were taught to develop their interest towards English language.

The student teachers handled ten classes in this academic year. Four lessons were taught to the students. The course ended with a valediction program on March 23, 2017. The staff-in-charge tested the learning outcome of the students by asking them oral questions. Small gifts were given to encourage the students who gave the right



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answers. Various language games were conducted and prizes were given to the winners. Simple songs and action songs were taught. Special prizes and shields were given to two best participants.



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

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
